

The Meaning of the Widow's Mite

During the time of Herod, mites were the smallest denomination coin in Judea. The term "widow's mite" is based on Luke 21:1-4.

As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. "Truly I tell you," he said, "This poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."

As the Bible reminds us, even small offerings can make an enormous impact. The Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" - offerings above and beyond the support given to Zion. Combined, these amount to millions of dollars for funding mission grants and providing ongoing support for various other Lutheran Women in Mission programs.

If you don't have a mite box, there is a basket on the glass counter in the narthex. Please pick one up and fill it with your "mites." Our next "ingathering" of mite offerings will be after Easter, April 6-7. At that time, you can bring your box, dump the contents into the giant mite box. Take your mite box home with you and begin placing offerings in it again.

Lutheran Women in Mission - Your Mite Offerings Make an Impact!

Here are some examples of how your mite offerings work within our church, our community and our world. The following are examples of good stewardship.

Mission Moment - In the Southern Illinois District

Braille Centers in SID - \$8,000

There are four Braille Production Centers in our district. Each of these centers make Braille and/or large print books for the blind and visually impaired, thereby showing the love of God to people so they can grow in their relationship with God. The centers will use the funds for special sized heavy paper, binding spirals, front and back covers, cartons and corrugated cardboard for shipping and packing tape. The outreach of Lutheran Braille Workers is global, reaching many different countries and language groups.

Camp Wartburg's "Shepherding Sheep" Camp for people with disabilities -\$5,000

"Shepherding Sheep" is a camp which connects young people who are willing to serve with youth and adults who are challenged by mental and/or physical disabilities. This \$5,000 grant would help several disabled people afford camp where they can be loved by staff and learn that they really matter to our churches and especially to Christ.

Lutheran Campus Ministry at LCMS-U@SIUE, Edwardsville - \$3,500

In every stage of life, the church is present to offer age-appropriate education and discipleship that seeks to confirm in the lives of people the all-encompassing extent of Christ's call to life and salvation. The work of LCMS-U@SIUE is to raise up young people who know who their Lord is and who they are in Him. The grant will be used to purchase Bibles, catechisms and other study materials needed for weekly Bible study and distribution on campus as well as support monthly fellowship opportunities.


Upcoming Fellowship Events:

Zion's Alumni & Friends News

Did you know the Alumni & Friends Organization was started in the 1990's to support the growth and mission of Zion Lutheran School and Church. Originally the funds came from a small membership fee. Later the group took over the annual dinner auction. In 2019, a Newsletter and Annual Appeal letter was sent to Zion members, past alumni that attended Zion, people that were confirmed at Zion, or are a friend of Zion. With the annual funds and memorials received since 2019, the front school door and window have been replaced, the school front landscaping by the new window was replaced, a lighted cross was given as a memorial to Rink Calcari, the school back door and repairs to the concrete drainage were done, 36 gym lights were replaced with energy efficient LED lights, and church roof repairs were made. The 2023 Appeal Letter was for needed upgrades to Zion School and Church Security Systems. The goal was \$10,000 for the first phase of upgrades. With your great response, Alumni and Friends received \$11,171.00 toward the project, with final plans to be available soon.




